Just like this old broadsheet flyer published by the Marysville Democrat newspaper over a century ago, landscape photos today in our local newspapers frequently include the iconic and familiar silhouette of the Sutter Buttes in the background, whether they were snapped in the Yuba, Sutter, or Colusa Counties.

That landmark has become a symbol for the agricultural enterprise that has contributed to a picturesque rural setting, and it makes our Sacramento Valley communities desirable places to settle and to raise our families. Local Ag has grown into a billion dollar industry that enhances the quality of our lives while providing a scenic backdrop that no urban area can provide!

That promontory is a comforting presence of permanence, and a reassurance that we are home. That impression is what makes it such an iconic image and the inspiration for our name and logo. Indeed, many area businesses have also chosen to identify themselves with its name or outline.

Numerous family farms in our surrounding tri-county area have family histories that date back 100 to 150 years. Old county maps label these family names on their sizable holdings. The farming and ranching heritage of these families have preserved a way of life and a pleasant community ambiance for us all.

The Sutter Buttes Regional Land Trust salutes these families. Our partnerships provides mechanisms and legal agreements to protect these families' heritage and farm lands from development into perpetuity. They are called conservation easements.

We have initiated dialog and filings with four families in and around the Buttes, we hold easements on several other properties, and we have just completed one easement this past spring.


It is 376 acres of farmland that will now stay that way forever. This farmer was committed to securing the protection of a conservation easement that we worked on for six years. He can rest easy knowing the lifestyle he enjoyed as a child will be protected.

"I remember going fishing and hunting, riding bikes and horses here — I want to preserve that," he said. "Not every place is designed to build homes."


Together we honor what these landowners' parents and grandparents lived for and what they died for!

It is a legacy that we are very proud of and we will work diligently to continue to build on that history and foundation.




2016 Calendars

What is a Conservation Easement?

A conservation easement is a deed restriction. landowners voluntarily place on their property to protect resources such as productive agricultural land, ground and surface water, habitat, historic sites or scenic views. They are used by landowners ("grantors") to authorize a qualified conservation organization or public agency ("grantee") to monitor and enforce the restrictions set forth in the agreement. Conservation easements are flexible documents tailored to each property and the needs of individual landowners. They cover either an entire parcel or portions of a property. The landowner usually works with the prospective grantee to decide which activities should be limited to protect specific resources. Agricultural conservation easements are designed to keep land available for farming.


